

This year the Maine's Sheriff's Association (MSA) spearheaded the Maine Pharmaceutical Waste collection for the State of Maine.


The Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) decided to turn the administration of

the program over to the MSA with all 16 Maine sheriff's agreeing to continue the program in their respective counties. AVCOG worked in cooperation with the Maine Sheriff's Association, Healthy Androscoggin, the Police Departments of Lewiston and Auburn and many others.

The total weight for the Sate of Maine was 23,530 pounds of collected pharmaceutical waste.



There are several permanent drop sites that are available year round which are free and anonymous. These collection sites are located at the Auburn, Farmington, Fryeburg, Lisbon, Livermore Falls, Oxford, Mechanic Falls, Rumford, and Sabattus Police Departments as well as the Greene Village Pharmacy located at 19B Patten Road, Greene.

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Northern Border Regional Commission Grant Funds

Established by Congress in 2008, the Northern Border Regional Commission (NBRC) is a working partnership between the federal government and the States of New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine. The mission of the NBRC is to fund economic development and infrastructure projects throughout designated counties in its four state service area. The NBRC has just announced its 2015 grant round. Applications for Androscoggin, Franklin and Northern Oxford County (north of Fryeburg) are to be sent to AVCOG c/o Amy Landry, 125 Manley Rd, Auburn, ME 04210. Applications are due by 4 pm on June 19th, 2015. Awards are anticipated to be announced by early September.



Changes to Shoreland Zoning Guidelines Adopted

After a lengthy rule making process changes to the Guidelines for Municipal Shoreland Zoning

Ordinances became effective on January 26, 2015. The process to change the Guidelines began, yes, in 2011 with hearings and comment periods in 2014. AVCOG provided extensive comments on the drafts of the Guidelines a number of which were included in the adopted Guidelines. Unlike past changes to the Guidelines there has not been a date set for when local shoreland zoning ordinances must comply with the new minimum shoreland zoning standards. However, because of conflicts between the current Mandatory Shoreland Zoning Act and current locally adopted Shoreland Zoning Ordinances AVCOG recommends municipalities prepare amendments sooner than later.



Several of the more significant changes to the Guidelines are to bring them into consistency with changes to the Mandatory Shoreland Zoning Act adopted by the legislature in 2013. These include expansions of nonconforming structures, clearing of vegetation, contractors certified in erosion control, and definition of stream. Other changes are the result of recommendations of a stakeholder group that meet during 2011 and include nonvegetated surfaces, disability variances, definitions shoreland stabilization, and hazard and storm damaged trees.

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Transportation Achievement Award

At our Spring General Assembly Meeting held at Martindale Country Club in Auburn the City of Lewiston and the Town of Lisbon received the Transportation Achievement Award for their vision and commitment to establish a regional trail network and bring the East Coast Greenway into their downtowns. The award recognizes achievements in activities/efforts which lead to the development of transportation systems that promote safety, efficiency, and inter-modalism.

The Lewiston Riverside Greenway is 4.78 mile linear pathway for bicycling and walking along the Androscoggin River. The Riverside Greenway connects civic, employment, retail, service, and cultural destinations in downtown Lewiston and the

northern portion of Main Street (locally called "Outer Main Street") with diverse, populous neighborhoods. The final construction phase of the Riverside Greenway Project had its ribbon cutting ceremony last October, and since then, the area has been regularly used by walkers and bicyclists alike.

The Lisbon Trail System is a 3.35 mile linear pathway for bicycling, walking and cross-country skiing and includes the Paper Mill Trail, Ricker Farm Trail and the newly constructed Androscoggin River Trail. The trail system connects Lisbon's three villages to the public schools, and retail and service establishments. The final construction phase of the Lisbon Trail System had its ribbon cutting ceremony last August, and is open for walking, bicycling, cross-country skiing and snowmobiling. The trail has become so popular that town officials are considering wayfinding signs as well as optional parking to assist visitors.

Both trails are a culmination of 16 years of planning and development, and are a combination of off-road pathways and on-street bikeways marked by signage and/or striping. Detailed information about each trail can be found at http://www.ci.lewiston.me.us/ and www.lisbonme.org.

The East Coast Greenway Alliance, a non-profit organization developing a network of multi-use trails connecting cities from Calais, Maine to Key West, Florida - has designated the Lewiston Riverside Greenway and the Lisbon Trail System as part of its 2,900-mile travel route. The East Coast Greenway (ECG) is envisioned to be an off-road trail network linking publicly owned, firm-surface trails between Maine and Florida. With nearly 30% of the route already constructed on traffic-free greenways, the ECG is emerging as a safe, accessible route for people of all ages and abilities. The ECG provides opportunities for exercise, recreation, and transportation for the 30,000,000 Americans who live near the route and as a tourism destination for millions of visitors.

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Paris Designated AARP Age Friendly Community; Starts Planning for Its Seniors

The town of Paris recently became the third Maine community to become part of the AARP's Network of Age Friendly Communities. AVCOG members heard about the program, which provides a method for a community to prepare for emerging issues for seniors, at AVCOG's Planning Day last November 20th.

In Paris the initiative is being spearheaded by Sarah Glynn, an attorney at the Oxford Hills law firm, who practices with Linda Russell, who specializes in Elder Law. "For many months, if not years, my law partner and I have recognized that there is a dearth of ready support for our seniors. By the time folks get to our office, there are often real legal issues that could have been easily prevented if folks knew where to turn. Our senior population is extremely vulnerable, and we had been brainstorming ideas to bridge the gaps and fill the void for these people." Glynn thinks the program is a perfect adjunct to the town's Market Square Revitalization strategy.

Law partner Linda Russell heard about the AARP Age Friendly Community program at a meeting of the Oxford Hills chapter of the AARP. "When I heard about the AFC from Linda, the framework seemed perfect! The eight domains of livability, while focused on our seniors, run parallel to the general needs of the community to draw in families – and consequently businesses – to want to live within our Town limits. I can see the identification and development of these eight domains as being able to provide a continuum of care."

This initiative targets improvements that influence the health and quality of life of older adults in the community. The "eight domains of livability," which provide a framework for the age friendly plan, include:

- 1. Outdoor spaces and buildings.
- 2. Transportation
- 3. Housing
- 4. Social participation
- 5. Respect and social inclusion
- 6. Civic participation and employment
- 7. Communication and information
- 8. Community support and health services

Glynn is working with a group, now called the Paris Revitalization Committee, which finalized a Town Paris Strategic Plan for Market Square which was approved in December 2014. The Plan is available on the town's web site: www.parismaine.org. The plan includes several recommendations for improvement in three broad areas: Commercial Growth, Community Growth, and Beautification.

"I'm all for business and community growth, but we mustn't forget that we – as a community – should be thinking about the needs of our seniors so that we can stabilize and maintain a thriving community. As we began looking at the community resources, the help that is available is phenomenal! But the average Joe-citizen doesn't know how to access it, and there is no focal point to be able to provide the direction that people need." Glynn said.

The Paris Board of Selectmen approved the town's participation immediately when it heard about the age friendly program. "At their next meeting, the Board was presented with a letter and an application to submit to have Paris designated for this program. Both documents were approved and signed, and submitted the next day. Within one week, preliminary approval was received that Paris was accepted into the program. At the time, Paris was only the third community in Maine!," Glynn said.

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"The response from the Town has been terrific, and all seem very excited about it. We look forward to learning the results of the survey, and establishing a plan to address the needs of Paris," Glynn said,

"Our initial step is to obtain a baseline assessment of the community's age-friendliness, and involve older people throughout this cycle," Glynn said. An action plan will be developed based on the results of the assessment.

Regional residents can learn more about the Age Friendly Community program in Bethel at 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m., May 21, at Western Mountains Senior College on Aging in Place. The program will be held at Bethel Congregational Church, 32 Church Street. Panelists will include Peter Morelli, who leads the Age Friendly Community program for the AARP in Maine, and Patricia Oh, who led a similar age friendly effort in Bowdoinham, and others who will describe the Village concept for elder services.

Road Salt and Liquid Calcium Chloride

In the summer of each year, AVCOG conducts joint cooperative purchases of road salt and liquid calcium chloride. On the average, the road salt joint purchase saves towns approximately 10% of the "normal" purchase price. In many cases, the savings provides a significant offset to their town dues.

Culverts

Some of you may already know this year the state bid is not including municipalities. AVCOG will issue an RFP at the end of this year for the 2016 construction season. The bid will include a direct ship option for drop-off to your municipality, which ensures the best pricing. We will issue an RFP to Paris Farmers Union, EJ Prescott and WH Shurtliff. 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FREE SIGNS FOR AVCOG COMMUNITIES

MaineDOT has free 3-foot bicycle passing law signs for municipalities that would like to install them on state/state aid roads in their community.*
