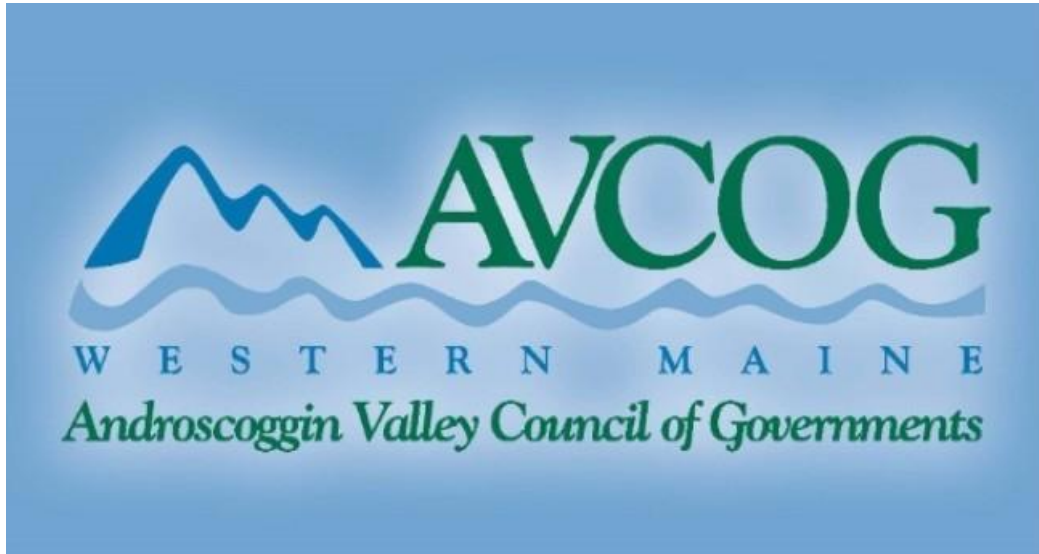

CMCC Dedicates New Gene Haas Precision Machining Technology Center

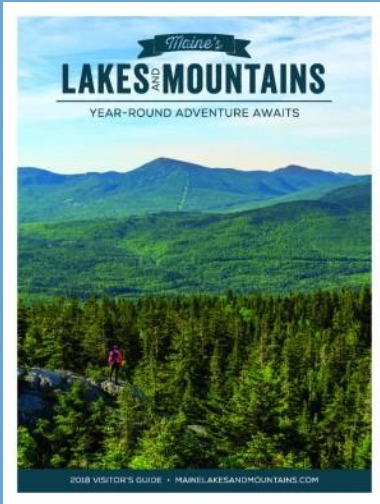

AUBURN — Government, industry and education officials joined Central Maine Community College students and employees at a dedication ceremony on Oct. 27 for the official opening of the Gene Haas Precision Machining Technology Center at the college.

The college began work on the project in spring 2017. The first phase involved an interior renovation of more than 5,000 square feet, including the relocation of the quality control room, offices, computer class and locker room to update and improve overall functionality. Phase Two was the construction of a 3,600-square-foot addition to accommodate equipment acquisitions, and improvements to existing electrical power distribution, lighting systems, and the mechanical ventilation system. The Gene Haas Foundation awarded the college a grant of \$1 million toward the project.

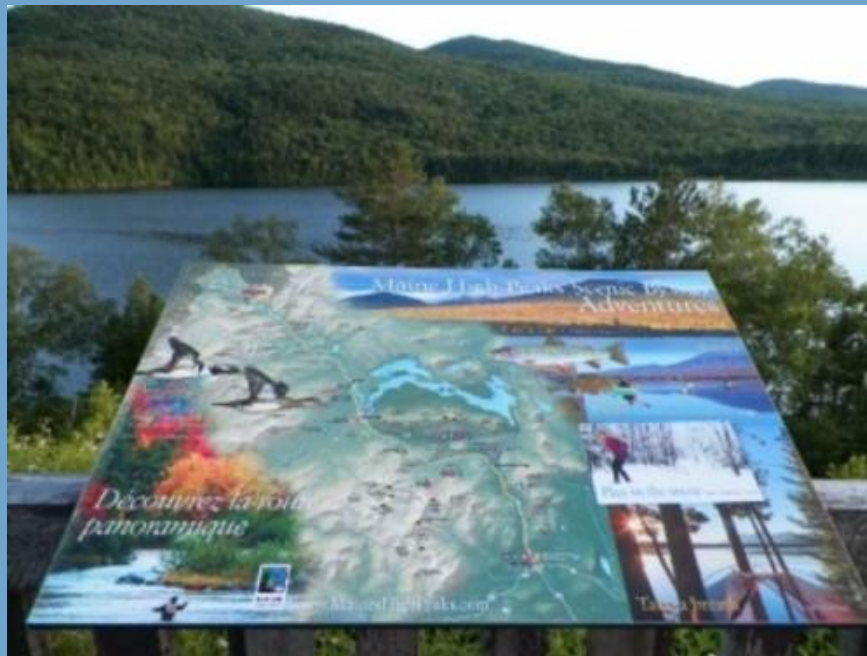
New Signage Along Maine High Peaks Scenic Byway

Eleven new signs welcome visitors with interesting stories about the region and the Maine High Peaks Scenic Byway. We're not talking about simple directional signage; we're talking beautiful, colorful, interpretive signs about the byway's history and notable natural attractions.

With a \$25,543 grant from the Franklin County Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District and an additional \$10,459 from the Maine Department of Transportation, the new interpretive signs were installed at four scenic turnouts along the byway – Sarampus Falls, AT turnout/Wyman, Flagstaff Lake and Chain of Ponds.

As Nadene McLeod, byway committee member and byway commuter, noted, "The new signs along the byway are very much being looked at by our visitors. It's great that they give people a chance to pause, learn and ponder staying in the region." This is exactly what the byway committee envisioned with this project. Now, in addition to a typical rest stop experience, visitors will learn about Benedict Arnold's trek through the region, the wonders of the Bigelow Range and what happened to the former village of Flagstaff, to name a few of the local topics featured on the signs.

The aptly named byway is located in the High Peaks Region, home to 10 of Maine's 14 peaks over 4,000 feet, offering numerous opportunities to soak in the dramatic landscapes, abundant wildlife and recreation opportunities. Those interested in exploring the 47-mile Maine High Peaks Scenic Byway will begin their scenic drive in the historic Franklin County town of Kingfield and end their tour at the Canadian border in Coburn Gore.

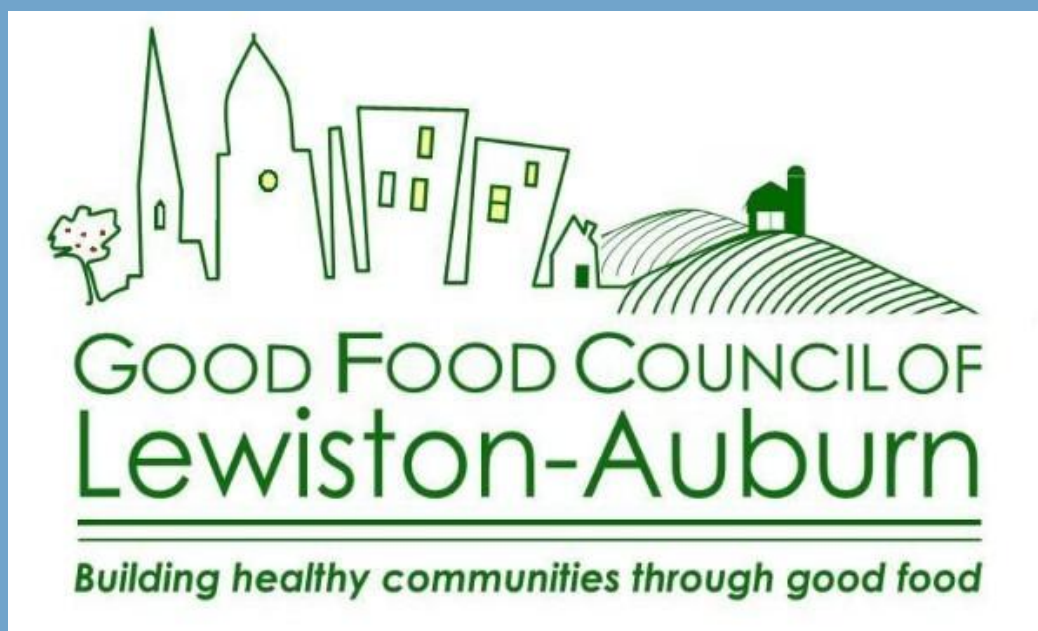

Feeding Maine Exhibit and Events
Growing Access to Good Food in LA

On January 19, the Good Food Council of Lewiston-Auburn (GFCLA) hosted an opening event for a photo exhibit by photographer, Brendan Bullock, with words by writer, Annie Murphy entitled, Feeding Maine: Growing Access to Good Food at the Atrium Gallery at the University of Southern Maine, Lewiston-Auburn College (USM LAC), 51 Westminister Street, Lewiston. All are invited to stop in and view the month-long exhibit.

Feeding Maine documents some of the many people working to address the persistent problem of hunger in communities across Maine. The exhibit was created by the Good Shepherd Food Bank and Maine Farmland Trust, a statewide organization working to protect farmland, support farmers, and advance farming. Community members will be invited to leave their thoughts, art, or photos, relating to their experiences with/reactions to the issues of hunger and food insecurity in Lewiston-Auburn on the interactive art wall where the exhibit will be on display from January 16-February 23.

A closing event titled, Creating a Path to Feeding L-A, will be held February 16, 5-8 p.m. and will feature light refreshments and music from Greg and Jessie Boardman. Efficient Delivery of Local and Regional Services Grant

Maine State Government's Fund for the Efficient Delivery of Local and Regional Services was established in 2005 to encourage intergovernmental cooperation on projects that will result in cost-savings, and ultimately a reduction in property taxes. In support of this, the Fund provides monetary assistance to municipalities, counties and state agencies that work together for this purpose.

Grants will be awarded for qualifying projects that are designed to achieve significant and sustainable savings in the cost of delivering local and regional government services, and that ultimately reduce the demand for property tax revenues. Savings must be achieved through collaborative approaches to service delivery, enhanced regional delivery systems, consolidated administrative services, broad-based purchasing alliances and interlocal agreements. Grants will not be awarded on proposals that serve a single entity; collaboration with other eligible government entities is required. Click here for more information about the fund.
